
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

Singapore may not enjoy a traditional white Christmas, but it's full of fabulous options nevertheless. For the complete experience, head down to Orchard Road and Singapore River, where there's no lack of things to do as you soak up the Christmas spirit amidst bedazzling light displays.

You'll want to have your camera ready to capture the magical scene along Orchard Road (November 15-January 1), decked out with sparkling, multi-coloured stars and largerthan-life festive ornaments. In the week leading up to Christmas, interactive booths and nightly performances along the street take the festivities to another level.

While you're here, check out the many seasonal bargains—whether you're shopping for loved ones or giving yourself a treat, the famed retail belt has got you covered.

Start your shopping jaunt by picking up the latest collections from exclusive labels here. Asian fashion is particularly hot right now, so hop over to cult multi-label boutique **i.t** from Hong Kong, which carries 11 brands, each with its own distinct style

and youthful edge. Also joining the bandwagon is evergreen retail destination **TANGS**, which now stocks brands like Kapok Tools from Hong Kong

and Headline Seoul from Korea. With eye-catching

candy colours and clean aesthetics, these labels add festive pizzazz to just about anyone's wardrobe.

Pair your finds with shoes from local shoe boutique **P.V.S**, which stocks an impressive collection of women's shoes from brands like Jeffrey Campbell and G.H Bass. Chock full of gladiator sandals, platform sneakers and towering heels, this store is certainly not for wallflowers. If it's locally designed shoes you're after, **Charles & Keith** is a household name not to be missed—snap up shoes and accessories at affordable prices here.

Shopping for a music lover? Vinyl is fast making a comeback here, and record store **House of Turntables** is testament to that, stocking used and new vinyl records as well as European-made equipment to play them with.

The young ones in your family deserve thoughtful gifts, too. **The Better Toy Store** is known for curated toys that combine both play and learning. Well-made and tasteful, these treasures

will certainly outlast run-ofthe-mill playthings.

If all that gift shopping has got your tummy growling, indulge your inner gourmand with some delectable goodies. Dreamy French patisserie **Ladurée** is

where you'll find their famed multi-coloured macarons, along with teas, jams and collectibles. For more adventurous treats, make a slight detour to **The Cookie Museum**. While you're sure to enjoy delicious creations like English lavender and Magdalene rose cookies, the real stars here are the savoury biscuits inspired by local dishes like *nasi lemak* (coconut rice with chilli paste and fried anchovies).

Or take a timeout and head to **Jones the Grocer** at Mandarin Gallery for a quick pick-me-up; there are plenty of fine teas, light bites and desserts here to choose from. Also in the same building is **Wild Honey**, famed for its all day breakfasts inspired by world cuisines. Whether you fancy European-style poached eggs or spicy Tunisian shakshouka



stew, there's bound to be something for every palate.

Also worth checking out for their festive feasts are **PS. Café** and **The Marmalade Pantry**. The former is known for their excellent mains, truffle fries and rich desserts. while the latter

is a hot spot for peoplewatching as you tuck in to their giant salads and hearty pastas.

Another must-visit part of the city at this time of the year is Sentosa and HarbourFront (November 22-December 26), where you can expect stunning 3D projection mapping on the waterfront to spread the good cheer. Keep a lookout for festive deals at the hotels, restaurants, shopping malls and attractions in the vicinity.

More waterfront festivities can be found along the Singapore River. Home to some of the city's best bars and hottest nightspots, this stretch—comprising Boat Quay, Clarke Quay and Robertson Quay—turns into a Christmas carnival at nightfall (November 14-January 2), complete with dazzling lights, carollers on river boats, fireworks and a pop-up market for a truly memorable experience. You'll certainly want to wind down with a scenic riverside walk to admire the view, or better yet, hop on the Christmas decorated **Singapore River Cruise** boat to take in the sights and sounds of the city in a celebratory mood. The last river shuttle leaves at 10.30pm and will make a tour around the Esplanade and Marina Bay Sands<sup>®</sup> before taking you back to the starting point.

Back on dry land, more gastronomic delights await at sophisticated restaurants along the strip. Head to Enoteca L'Operetta for authentic Italian pizzas, pastas and mains, with a compact, upmarket wine list to go along, or French restaurant OCF, where chef Jonathan Koh whips up an extensive degustation menu. If you have a sweet tooth, the desserts at Laurent Bernard Chocolatier will leave you weak in the knees. Their much-raved-about chocolates will make welcome gifts for your loved ones.

And what's Christmas without some merrymaking? You're in the right place for an unforgettable taste of Singapore's vibrant nightlife scene. Mark the season with a festive toast at the lively, affordable **Wine** 



Connection Cheese Bar or the remarkable Verre Wine Bar, which boasts a cellar with over 750 hand-picked labels, including vintages like Château Latour and Château Lafite Rothschild. Or stop by Vintry at Royal Selangor. Its list of over 1,000 wines will certainly impress wine lovers.

If wine isn't your tipple of

choice, head to **Fine Spirits by La Maison du Whisky** for an incredible range of premium liquor, or **Bitters & Love**, which serves up unusual cocktails like the Kaya Toast, inspired by the local breakfast favourite and made with real *kaya* (coconut jam).

Bring the evening to a stunning close at **Fenix Room**,

a luxurious club inspired by The Great Gatsby, complete with velvet seats and Art Deco mirror panels. The Champagnefocused drinks list here is ideal for fuelling a night of dancing.

With so many Christmas options available in sunny Singapore, there's absolutely no reason not to live it up and celebrate with a tropical twist.

One of the highest rooftop bars in the world, standing at 282 metres above ground, this openair bar offers an unobstructed, 360-degree view of Singapore. Fantastic food and cocktails make this a top spot among New Year's Eve partygoers.

# ADRENALINE RUSH

Singapore Sports Hub, the city's latest sports and entertainment offering, is all set to impress.



Most visitors are familiar with Singapore's fantastic attractions, our great shopping strips, our vibrant nightspots and our irresistible food. But what's less talked-about is our growing sporting culture, marked by major milestones like hosting the world's first F1 night race with the Formula 1 Singapore Airlines Singapore Grand Prix and an increasing presence in

the Olympics, thanks to local athletes like table tennis stars Li Jiawei and Feng Tianwei.

This year, the newly opened **Singapore Sports Hub** will be on everybody's lips. It's set to be the city's number one destination for all things sports and entertainment, including the prestigious and hotlyanticipated **BNP Paribas WTA Finals Singapore presented by SC Global** (October 17-26). Set to take place in Singapore for the first time ever this year, this mega sporting event will deliver plenty of thrilling action from international stars as they battle it out for the record US\$6.5million prize, the largest so far in the competition's 44-year history.

Come October 17, the eight top-ranked singles players and doubles teams will take to the courts to

demonstrate their athletic prowess. While players are still vying for points in the weekly WTA tournaments to climb the Road to Singapore leaderboard, fans can expect

top names like China's Li Na and USA's Serena Williams to headline the exciting event.

Besides seven days of competition, the tournament will also feature an

array of exciting highlights for a fully integrated experience. During the opening Fan Festival weekend, you can look forward to a showdown between four up-and-coming female players at the WTA **Rising Stars Exhibition** Competition, and catch legendary players such as former world number one player Martina Navratilova compete in the Legends exhibition matches. Also in Singapore will be Official WTA Finals Ambassadors Chris Evert and Billie Jean King. Fans can catch their favourite stars at scheduled practice court viewings, as well as participate in a plethora of fun and games. So do expect ten whole days of full-on tennis fever in October!

All this high-octane sporting action will take place at Singapore Sports Hub, a cluster of seven state-ofthe-art venues and facilities, each offering a different experience. The highlight of the hub is undoubtedly the all-new **National Stadium**, an architectural wonder in itself. Custom-built to accommodate many different types of sports, it is turfed with the cuttingedge hybrid of natural grass

and artificial fibres that's also found in London's famous Wembley Stadium. It also seats up to a whopping 55,000 spectators and boasts mobile seating tiers to deliver a truly spectacular experience.

But perhaps the stadium's most impressive feature is the dome-shaped roof, the largest of its kind in the world, which also doubles up as a gigantic projector screen. This retractable roof is made out of a high-tech, heat-blocking material that, together with a cleverly-engineered air cooling system, greatly reduces the amount of energy required to keep athletes, performers and spectators cool (as compared to conventional air conditioning).

Plenty more lies in store at the Singapore Sports Hub even after the intense tennis season is over. Visitors can look forward to more unmissable events across a wide range of sports, including the 2014 ASEAN Football Federation (AFF) Suzuki Cup (November 22-December 20) this year. The upcoming **2015** Southeast Asian (SEA) Games (June 5-16 2015) is a major highlight on the regional sports calendar, while the annual World Club 10s (dates to be announced) tournament is a must-catch for rugby fanatics.

In addition, the new National Stadium will play host to massive entertainment events, with stars like Taiwanese Mandopop royalty **Jay Chou** (November 8) and the wildly successful UK boy band **One Direction** (March 11 2015) ready to thrill audiences with their electrifying performances.

It's worth noting that the Singapore Sports Hub is no



stranger to musical megastars. The 12,000-seater **Singapore Indoor Stadium** just next door (where the WTA Finals will take place) has also played host to big names like legendary English musician Eric Clapton, pop stars Bruno Mars and Taylor Swift, and Mandopop icon Stefanie Sun.

Apart from sports and entertainment spectator events, the Sports Hub also has several other integral components that will propel the venue as a destination for everyone. Multi-purpose sports centre OCBC Arena, which consists of six halls across two blocks, is open to public for activities such as badminton. netball, basketball, volleyball and table tennis. There's also a myriad of other community sports and recreation spaces—a playground, game courts, rock climbing wall, skate park, beach volleyball facilities and more.

Water babies will be delighted to know there are not one but three facilities




dedicated to water sports at the Sports Hub. The biggest of these is the 6,000-capacity **OCBC Aquatic Centre**,

where big-name athletes are expected to compete at water polo, diving and synchronised swimming events. It features a 50-metre competition pool, a 50-metre training pool, a five-metre-deep diving pool as well as leisure facilities to round out the experience.

If you want to get your feet wet yourself, check out **Splash-N-Surf** and the **Water Sports Centre**, both excellent for recreational water activities. One major highlight of the former is the Stingray<sup>®</sup>, a surfing facility for body boarding and skim boarding, while the latter offers canoe and kayak rentals. Avid boaters can take up the challenge to complete the 500-metre Regatta course along the scenic Kallang Basin.

For a more laid-back time, check out the **Singapore Sports Museum**, a first-ever in the country with its sole focus on sports-related exhibitions and galleries. Permanent



exhibitions include Building a Dream, which takes visitors through Singapore's sports history, and Dream Venue, an in-depth look at the previous National Stadium and its most celebrated moments. Alternatively, cool off at the 41,000-square-metre **Kallang**  Wave shopping mall and browse big high street fashion stores like H&M, Uniglo and Forever 21.

With so many great reasons—from marquee sporting events to diverse recreational facilities—to visit, the Singapore Sports Hub looks set to be a buzzing epicentre of sports and entertainment, as well as the city's newest architectural icon.

# DINING IN THE PARK

Eat to your heart's content in the great outdoors.



he next time you head out for a feast, consider having your meal away from the hustle and bustle of the city. After all, with lush greenery, plenty of fresh air and balmy weather all year round, Singapore is perfect for alfresco dining.

One of the country's most celebrated green venues is Singapore Botanic Gardens, boasting a stunning collection of over 10,000 types of plants. Headlining one of the Gardens' main features—the one-hectare Ginger Garden, which is home to over 250 species of ginger—is the stunning restaurant **The Halia**. Offering up European cuisine with an Asian twist, chef Peter Rollinson perfectly executes must-try creations like roasted rack of lamb in Javanese spice.

Another green hideaway to explore is just off the Orchard shopping belt. Away from the crowds and shopping malls, the tranquil Scotts Road is also a haven for history buffs with its many preserved colonial bungalows. The Song of India and Indocafe offer two very different culinary experiences. The menu at the former is crafted by chef Manjunath Mural, whose focus is mainly fine Indian cuisine, while the latter is the go-to place for scrumptious modern Peranakan (Straits Chinese) fare. For some postmeal drinks, hit the bar next

door, **Néktar**. This premium cocktail bar is a great spot for heady tipples with friends or business associates. Just tell the resident mixologists what you're in the mood for, and they'll whip something up.

**Spruce** is a hidden gem just a few minutes from Orchard by taxi. This unpretentious eatery serves comforting casual American fare like beef short ribs and the classic cheeseburger (known as the 'Spruce Burger' here).

A short bus ride down from Orchard will take you to Dempsey Hill, another enclave that's full of dining options. Virtually out of sight from the main road, most of the restaurants here are



surrounded by greenery. Indulge in brunch at the outdoor section of **House**, order the tempting Alaskan king crab tagliatelle at **The White Rabbit** (which is housed in a beautifully restored chapel), or kick back and relax with a drink or two at garden bar **The Green Door**, while admiring the

while admiring the whimsical Alice in Wonderlandinspired décor.

The southwestern The region of Singapore has a different charm and even more alfresco options for nature-loving foodies. In the forested Labrador Nature Reserve, which contains the only rocky sea-cliff in the country, there's Tamarind Hill, where you'll find Thai specialties like duck curry. After your meal, go for a walk around the park and take in panoramic views of the sea.

Nearby, there's also French restaurant **Vineyard** at green hub, HortPark. Tuck into comforting favourites such as seafood bouillabaisse and take your pick from nearly 100 wines from around the world, all while enjoying the sights and sounds of the surrounding foliage.

If you plan to experience Singapore's famed cable car ride be sure to stop by Mount Faber for a meal at

> Faber Bistro. With an 'edible garden' right in its backyard, Faber Bistro offers unrivalled views of the city skyline and dishes ranging from small snacks to hearty mains, such as crabmeat

salad and pan-fried salmon steak. This casual dining venue attracts lovers looking for a romantic night out, families wanting a feast, and even runners taking on Mount Faber's uphill track.

No green experience is complete without a visit to Gardens by the Bay and the 'Supertrees' that tower 25 to 50 metres overhead. After exploring the Gardens, head to the climate-controlled Flower Dome for **POLLEN**, which features Mediterraneaninspired modern European cuisine by Michelin starred chef Jason Atherton. Recommended eats include iberico pork collar with octopus and poached lobster tail with black squid.

For those who want to venture farther out, there are delightful spots like **Ristorante Pietrasanta**, **Nosh Restaurant and Bar** and **Riders Café**. Located amid the greenery of Portsdown Road, Tuscaninspired Ristorante Pietrasanta promises an authentic Italian dining experience with an extensive range of pastas (the spinach and ricotta ravioli is to die for), soups and pizzas to choose from, while Nosh

Restaurant and Bar at Rochester Park whips up a good mix of brunch specials like buttermilk pancakes, romantic dateworthy mains such as wild mushroom risotto, tempting

Néktar snacks like the Maryland crabcakes, and top-notch cocktails such as Canned Heat—a fiery-sweet vodka - concoction with strawberry,





mint, black pepper and chilli.

At the well-loved Riders Café, expect to dine in the company of horses, as this popular brunch spot (try the smoked salmon and creamed eggs) is situated at the Bukit Timah Saddle Club.

In the heartlands, there's more in store for you. Connecting Bishan and Ang Mo Kio is a huge park that's particularly popular with runners and dog owners. In the heart of this green attraction lie **GRUB** and **The Green Room Café**. The former is all about natural and sustainably sourced ingredients with no preservatives or additives. Items like the crispy fish burger and the pork steak burger have been all the rage since the bistro opened. At the latter, indulge in a meat-free menu, including desserts, soups, and drinks that are all vegan-friendly. One must-try is the creamy mushroom soup.

Over on the east side of Singapore, Changi oozes an old world charm unlike any other destination in the country. Surrounded by trees and tucked away along Netheravon Road, **The Coastal Settlement** truly is a blast from the past with its many quirky antiques on display inside the restaurant, café and bar. Here you'll find a mix of Western and local dishes like curry chicken, *mee siam* (thin rice noodles in spicy, sweet, sour gravy), pasta and waffles. Feel free to walk in dressed casually.

With so many reasons to go alfresco, you have no excuse to stay cooped up indoors!

# LIGHTING UP DEEPAVALI

A look into the Festival of Lights and how you can join in the dazzling celebrations.



Deepavali, which means 'rows of light' in Sanskrit, is one of the most important festivals in the Hindu calendar. Falling on October 22 this year, the Festival of Lights, as it is also called, honours the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness, and is widely celebrated by Hindus around the world with considerable fanfare and enthusiasm.

Singapore's Little India is a must-visit during the festival when the neighbourhood is festooned with eye-popping colours and mesmerising light displays. The area teems with activity, especially in the temporary bazaars that spring up in the area.

There, you'll find stalls selling *saris*, which are colourful traditional garments worn by women throughout the Indian subcontinent, alongside intricate costume jewellery, traditional arts and crafts, floral garlands and a mouth-watering selection of festive treats.

Hindu temples all over Singapore also bustle with devotees gathering to give thanks and recite prayers to deities. While in Little India, stop by religious sites such as the Sri Veeramakaliamman, Sri Vadapathira Kaliamman and Sri Srinivasa Perumal Temples. Mornings before noon and evenings after 6pm are both





good times to visit—that's when you can witness ceremonies performed by Hindu priests.

To welcome the arrival of Deepavali, Hindus light lamps to mark the occasion, as well as clean and decorate their homes with flowers and ornaments. The ground is decorated with coloured rice or rice powder, forming intricate designs called *kolams* or *rangoli*. This form of beautiful Indian folk art is said to bring good luck and peace.

When stocking up on the necessary festive supplies, the local Indian community goes to Little India where there are plenty of specialty shops to be found; they drop by Jothi Store & Flower Shop to purchase jasmine garlands and prayer items, or head to Rasool Shop for spice mixtures and traditional ingredients, for example. The one place that draws huge crowds all year round is Mustafa Centre, a 24-hour department store that stocks pretty much everything you can think of-from fresh produce and clothing to electronics and airline tickets—at bargain prices.

# WHY THE FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS?

There are various stories and legends from Hindu scriptures surrounding the origin of Deepavali. One well-known tale has the divine ruler Lord Sri Krishna slaying the evil King Narakasura, thus freeing the people from a reign of terror. In ancient times, people lit *diyas* (earthen oil lamps); this tradition continues, albeit sometimes with more modern lights, to this day.





New clothes and accessories are a must to celebrate the occasion. If you'd like to own a traditional Indian dress but want to avoid the crowded bazaars. visit Haniffa Textiles for its wide variety of saris. Buying gold accessories during the festive season is considered auspicious for it symbolises prosperity, so jewellery stores like Abiraame Jewellers and Selvasegara Jewellers,



which offer varied designs at competitive prices, are always filled with shoppers. Another way to get into the Deepavali spirit is to have your hand painted with traditional henna art by local artists at Vanessa Beauty Salon. These temporary tattoos are drawn with a paste made from the henna plant, which is used to dye skin.

A key part of Deepavali is visiting family and friends, and it's become a tradition among locals to drop in at their Indian friends' homes. It is customary to exchange

homemade festive sweets like jalebi

(deep fried batter in syrup), and ney urundai (green mung bean sweets). Visiting quests also get to enjoy a sumptuous spread of delicious curries, tandoori

Indian sweets at

chicken, briyani (rice cooked with spices and served with meat or vegetable curry) and other delectable Indian dishes.

When it comes to gathering authentic ingredients to prepare traditional dishes, Tekka Centre is where Indians go to do their grocery shopping. Housing a food centre, retail shops and wet market, this landmark

in Little India boasts a multicultural shopping experience with Chinese vendors. Indian stall owners and Malay retailers hawking specialty products. In addition to meat and produce, Komala Vilas Restaurant the wet market has

> a selection of spices and vegetables flown in from Sri Lanka and India that are integral to Indian cuisine.

If you have yet to try Indian food, make your way to The



Banana Leaf Apolo for some delicious South Indian fare. You'll want to order signature dishes like fish head curry and chicken *tikka masala* (chicken in a spicy tomato cream sauce) served on banana leaves. Vegetarians can look forward to mouth-watering dishes like *dosai* (fermented crepe) and *palak paneer* (spinach and cottage cheese in thick curry) at Komala Vilas Restaurant.

Little India should be part of your travel itinerary whenever you're here, but a visit during the Deepavali festivities promises an especially lively, culturally rich and truly memorable experience. Vintage finds are all the rage and have been popping up at stores across the country, and **The Damn Good Shop** is one place to get them. Started by the creative geniuses behind local social media marketing agency Goodstuph, this emporium houses one-off vintage goods, as well as products by local companies like retro eyewear brand Mystic Vintage and eyecatching artwork by design company FLABSLAB. However, be sure to plan your visit well ahead of time. The Damn Good Shop is primarily an online entity, and their store at Maxwell Road only opens from 8pm to midnight every first Friday of the month.

Similarly, communitycentred arts establishment and design studio **FARM** sells both online and from their store, which is open Mondays to Fridays from 10am to 6pm. Curated by a young team of passionate art enthusiasts, FARM's colourful, wacky and highly original collection of products are all made in Singapore, and represent the country, its culture and its history. Here you'll find classic games, like 'five stones'—a toss-and-catch game played with small triangular cloth bags filled with rice or sand, similar to jacks—pretty tote bags with designs of old Chinese calendars, and drinking glasses with funny catchphrases in local lingo (also known as 'Singlish') printed on them.

If you're after something more cutting-edge, pop by **The Museum Shop**. Located at the ground floor of the Red Dot Design Museum, the store features an assortment of award-winning products that have been recognised for their exceptional design quality by an international jury. From Bluetooth-enabled speakers by Singapore-based company Xmi, to Red Dot's yearbooks featuring the best and the

latest design innovations and concepts, take the time to study the labels attached to each product and the littleknown stories behind them.

For a good mix of vintage and modern trinkets, The Central at Clarke Quay is a must-visit. Hit up fun gift store **Shinnpark** for cute, curious collectibles ranging from adorable post-it notes fashioned after local desserts and aprons with cooking guides printed on them. It's full of surprises as it constantly brings in both local and international labels to keep the range fresh.

Also worth a visit is **Goods of Desire**, where East meets West with their range of products. Although the store hails from Hong Kong, it represents Singapore's everpresent Cantonese culture. Stocks consist of pretty much anything you can think of, from oriental-style mouse pads to bookmarks with Chinese characters printed on them, but they change often and come in limited numbers, so get them while they're hot. Look out for special items you won't find anywhere else made in collaboration with local designers.

Apart from Clarke Quay, another hotspot for souvenir collectors is Bugis. With its eclectic mix of streetwear, printed t-shirts, watches, mobile phone accessories and other quirky bric-abrac, the busy **Bugis Street** market is a favourite haunt of locals and visitors alike.

Afterwards, you can take a breather and enjoy a leisurely browse through cosy indie store **Cat Socrates** at the nearby Bras Basah Complex. Hot sellers like scrapbooking essentials, cutesy stationery, robot tin toys, and their prized 'moustache' collection (pouches, umbrellas, you name it) make fantastic buys for all ages.

For the ultimate blast from the past, check out **The Heritage Shop** at Jalan Sultan. This antique store is packed to the brim with thousands of collectibles reminiscent of Singapore's past, mainly from the 30s to the 60s. Besides selling vintage ware, it also doubles up as a props supplier to local theatres looking for hard-to-find items.

Something different can be found at **Toko Aljunied**, a store that specialises in Arab perfumes, Peranakan (Straits Chinese) outfits and batik clothing (made using an ageold manual dyeing method). One of the oldest stores in Singapore, you can pick up a variety of wallet-friendly fashion items, from satin gloves to *kebaya* (traditional Malay blouse-dress combination).

Over at hip neighbourhood Tiong Bahru, **BooksActually** 







doesn't only focus on paper products, but also on nifty merchandise including tote bags, mugs, and other fun items like miniature vintage beer bottles. Events are often held here, so if you're lucky you can also meet up-and-coming authors, or catch acoustic performances by local singers.

At homegrown fashion lifestyle retailer TANGS, you can pick up tasteful gifts such as Asian-inspired ceramics and gorgeous centrepieces, made using natural tropical foliage, at the New Heritage Shop. Exclusively at TANGS is local brand Animal Merchandise, which sells animal-themed home-ware like colourful placemats. Animal Merchandise supports animal welfare shelters and wildlife sanctuaries, both locally and globally, so shop for a cause and see your dollar go that much further.

Simpler mementos can be found at the stores of Singapore's iconic museums, ArtScience Museum, National Museum of Singapore, and Singapore Art Museum. These places of interest carry

keepsakes like keychains and tote bags bearing the symbol of the Merlion (the half-lion, half-fish that represents Singapore), models of the city's key landmarks, as well as Singapore-themed iPhone covers and sketch books.

Edible souvenirs are excellent gift ideas for foodies. At **The Cookie Museum**, tourists go wild for the unique treats from both the Singapore Heritage Flavours series and the Singapore Orchid series.



The former consists of cookies that taste like quintessential Singaporean dishes like Hainanese chicken rice, *nasi lemak* (a Malay rice dish prepared with coconut milk), and pandan chiffon cake, a well-loved confectionery sold at many bakeries. The latter pays homage to the national flower of Singapore with floral, fruity flavours like the Vanda Miss Joaquim, orchid lychee and orchid mango.

If you've tried toast with kaya (coconut jam) and loved it, why not purchase the good stuff to savour back at home? At the famous **Ya Kun Kaya Toast**, their kaya recipe is sold by the bottle and is perfect as a breakfast spread or afternoon snack. Ya Kun's special coffee powder and house-brand cookies are also available for purchase at the coffee chain's many outlets across the island.

To further satisfy your craving for edible souvenirs, head to any major supermarket, such as NTUC FairPrice or Cold Storage, and look for Prima Taste Sauce Kits. Having these ready-to-cook pastes and sauces on hand will make it that much easier for you to recreate the taste of Singaporean food, no matter where you are in the world. There's an extensive range of kits to choose from, like curry, laksa (a spicy coconutbased noodle soup) and chilli crab. Follow the cooking steps on the packaging and you'll be whipping up authentic dishes in no time.

Additionally, if you can handle the heat, add a bottle of *belachan* (chilli sauce made with shrimp paste) to your purchase. This is one condiment that many locals can't get enough of and it undoubtedly adds that extra oomph to your meal.







#### STORE OPENING HOURS Most shops open from 10am-9.30pm daily.

TIPPING It is not usual practice to tip in Singapore, although it is appreciated by service staff. Most hotels and restaurants quote prices as "++," which includes 10 percent service charge and 7 percent goods and services tax (GST).

#### LOST PASSPORT/SINGAPORE IMMIGRATION

SERVICES If you've lost your passport, make a police report; then head to Immigration & Checkpoints Authority (10 Kallang Road, # (65) 6391-6100) to get a temporary visa.

SMOKING Smoking is banned in shopping centres, restaurants, cinemas, public buses, the MRT, taxis, in lifts and within 5m of any entrance and exit

DRINKING WATER Water in Singapore is clean and safe to drink from the tap.

Mandarin, Tamil, Malay and various dialects are also used

MASS RAPID TRANSIT (MRT) Trains run from about 5.30am to 12.00am. Standard tickets vary from \$1.10 to \$2.20. For more information call the SMRT Hotline = (65) 6331-1000. www.smrt.com.sq

#### GST Refunds

To enjoy the 7% Goods and Services Tax (GST) refunds paid on your purchases under the Tourist Tax Refund Scheme, you must make at least S\$100 worth of purchases from participating outlets. Such shops will display a 'Tax Refund' logo or a Global Blue 'Tax Free Shopping' logo. On your day of departure from Singapore Changi Airport, proceed to the Tax Refund Counter and present your purchases together with the tax claim forms for customs

inspection. Take note that Customs will not process the tax claim forms if the goods are not presented for inspection. For more information, please log on to the Tourist Refund Scheme page on the Singapore Customs website at www.customs.gov.sg.



Skip the queues and file your GST claims at the eTRS self-help kiosk at Changi Airport before you fly! All you need to do is shop at places that display the eTRS sign and use one credit card as a Token for tagging all your purchases. Tourists departing on international cruises from Marina Bay Cruise Centre Singapore and the International Passenger Terminal at HarbourFront Centre may also qualify for tax refund. 
