


VISIT KAMPONG GELAM



Kampong Gelam has its origins as a thriving port town and is Singapore's oldest urban quarter. In 1819, when the Sultan of Singapore signed a treaty with the East India Company, he brought his family to the district and built a 56-acre istana, or palace, from Rochor River to Beach Road. With the arrival of traders from the region including Arab merchants, the area soon became a flourishing centre of trade for precious materials such as timber, ceramics, gems, spices and textiles. Today, Kampong Gelam retains its cosmopolitan bustle through an array of culinary delights, traditional shops and prominent sites, including Sultan Mosque and Malay Heritage Centre which is housed in the Istana Kampong Gelam, a gazetted National Monument.

FROM PAST TO PRESENT



In Malay, the word Kampong means "compound", while Gelam refers to the the gelam tree which was found and used locally for boat-making, medicine and even as a seasoning for food.

This thriving settlement was a home to diverse communities of immigrants and traders from Asia and the Middle East, including India, China and the Malay Archipelago, all congregating to engage in a wide range of businesses, including education and philanthropy.

Kampong Gelam was known for its bustling streets of craftsmen and shops selling an array of items from spices and silks, gold and precious stones to baskets and sarongs. While Bussorah Street might now be known as a colourful street of restaurants, it was home to a range of businesses including bookshops, blacksmiths, jewellery shops, and even coppersmiths. On Arab Street, baskets and textiles were commonplace, while Haji Lane hosted Muslim pilgrims on their yearly pilgrimage to Mecca, known as the 'Hajj'.

Today, many of these heritage businesses still remain, giving Kampong Gelam its charm of colourful diversity that sits at the crossroads of the traditional and the contemporary. Modern businesses and cafes sit side-by-side with heritage tradesmen and eateries, within conserved shophouses along alleys peppered with vibrant street art.

ADMIRE THE STREET ART OF SINGAPORE



Home to street art collectives like RSCLS as well as Singapore's first physical graffiti store The Blackbook Studio, Kampong Gelam is a regular haunt for street artists and has become Singapore's street art capital. The vibrant neighbourhood boasts of street art enclaves that feature the works of local and international street artists on charming shophouses.

Wander along the streets of Kampong Gelam and you will be able to uncover street art ranging from striking realist murals to colourful futuristic murals. If you are lucky, you will be able to catch street artists in action as they practise and paint.

LITTLE INDIA




A thriving community hub for Indian immigrants, Little India is filled with traditional businesses and historical architecture.

HAJI LANE / BALI LANE



Along the narrow street of Haji Lane, you can find the eye-catching pop-art by artist PrettyFreakyFantasy. Close by, Mexican restaurant Piedra Negra showcases huge works by Columbian-born artist Didier Jaba Mathieu.



Located at 71 Sultan Gate, the arts enclave bursts with urban art by local and international artists. Next to The Blackbook Studio is a 14-metre-long wall where artists practise and paint — the perfect place to watch them in action. Look out for the original batik piece by artist Slacsatu near Kiah's Gallery that has been readapted all around Kampong Gelam.

GELAM GALLERY



Singapore's first outdoor art gallery, Gelam Gallery can be found in the back alley adjacent to Muscat Street. The out-of-the-box gallery displays over 30 artworks by local and international artists. Be immersed in unique wall murals and framed art as you explore the artsy neighbourhood.

The multi-disciplinary arts hub is decorated with vivid murals by local street artists — a testament of their support for local budding creatives. Check out the wall of artwork behind the centre that changes every one to six months and the multi-coloured batik-inspired mural by Slacsatu near the entrance of the centre.



GELAM

Discover Kampong Gelam's rich history, living traditions, excellent eateries and trendy shops.



Get a glimpse of tradition and culture on your walk. Take a stroll down Haji Lane and enjoy colourful conserved shophouses housing trendy offerings. Visit the majestic Sultan Mosque (A6) for an understanding of history and Islam in Singapore. Go back through time at the Malay Heritage Centre (A4), once the palace of the Sultan of Singapore. Enjoy authentic Malay cuisines such as *nasi padang* (steamed rice served with a variety of dishes) and Malay kuih (cakes and cookies).

ROUTE

Spend half a day in the neighbourhood and uncover stories of heritage and culture. Be inspired by vintage photography at the Vintage Camera Museum (A7) before capturing the colourful and expressive murals of Kampong Gelam. Visit heritage businesses stepped in tradition, and treat yourself to a variety of food offerings that range from Malay and Indian to Middle Eastern and Indonesian fare.

HERITAGE DISHES



Nasi Padang

Work up an appetite while exploring Kampong Gelam and stop for a hearty meal of nasi padang, or rice with a medley of Malay dishes. Heritage establishments you can choose from include Warong Nasi Pariaman (B11), Hjh Maimunah (B4) and Sabar Menanti II (B8).



Briyani

For a mild fiery kick in your meal, sample the Indian rice staple brivani—a spiced rice dish that comes with meat or vegetables—at Islamic Restaurant (B5), Victory Restaurant (B10) or Singapore Zam Zam (B9). The eateries can be easily found along the stretch of North Bridge Road.



Murtabak

Stuffed with egg, onion and mutton or chicken, murtabak is a South Indian flatbread dish that can be enjoyed on its own or paired with a side of savoury curry. Head down to Singapore Zam Zam (B9) or Victory Restaurant (B10) to fill your bellies with their tasty murtabak.
