


## LITTLE INDIA



Little India's main stretch of commercial activity can be found along Serangoon Road, which was once known as "The road leading across the island" on Lieutenant Jackson's map of 1828 Singapore. The precinct has its early roots as a residential area for Europeans drawn to the area for the elite sport of horse racing, and later evolved into a thriving trade and community hub for the Indian migrants involved in the roaring cattle trade. Places of worship such as the famous Sri Veeramakaliamman Temple, the Sri Srinivasa Perumal Temple and the Angullia Mosque, and businesses and services catering to the needs of the Indian community sprouted as a result. Today, its rich history is evident in its architecture and traditional businesses that still exist in the precinct.


# KAMPONG GELAM

Once home to the Sultan of Singapore, Kampong Gelam retains its cosmopolitan bustle through an array of culinary delights, traditional shops and prominent sites, including Sultan Mosque and Malay Heritage Centre which is housed in the Istana Kampong Gelam, a gazetted National Monument.

# CHINATOWN

Home to early Chinese immigrants, Chinatown has become Singapore's largest conserved historic district.

### FROM PAST TO PRESENT




Known as "the road leading across the island" back in the 1800s, Serangoon Road is the main commercial road that intersects Rochor Canal Road and Sungei Road.

Located along Serangoon Road is Tekka Centre. Built in 1915, the original market was located across the street between Hastings Road and Sungei Road. It was later torn down in 1982 and relocated to its present site. The centre lends its name from the surrounding "bamboo clumps", which is the Mandarin translation of Tekka. A visit to Little India is also not complete without exploring the magnificent Sri Veeramakaliamman Temple, which is dedicated to the Hindu goddess Kali.

Little India is one of the most vibrant and charismatic ethnic districts in Singapore. On 7 July 1989, in recognition of its historical and cultural significance, Little India was gazetted as a conservation area. To this day, traditional businesses like goldsmiths, Indian restaurants and coffee shops, saree shops and stalls selling garlands and sweets continue to prosper alongside newer establishments like trendy cafes, boutiques and souvenir shops. There is round-the-clock activity from the clusters of night-time hangouts and late night eateries in the area.

### SAMPLE LOCAL FAVOURITES



Biryani "spicy rice" is a South Asian mixed rice dish of the Indian subcontinent. It is made with spices, rice and meat or egg. Ingredients vary according to the type of meat used and the region the biryani is from. Biryani dishes are very popular in Singapore, being an important part of Malaysian Indian cuisine and are popularised through hawker centres, food courts as well as restaurants.

In all biryani, the main ingredient that accompanies the spices is the chicken and mutton; special varieties used include prawn and fish. The dish may be served with dahi chutney (yoghurt mint dip) or raita (variations of chutney containing yoghurt), dalcha (a type of curry), a sour dish of aubergine, boiled egg and salad.



Masala Thosai (Indian pancake made from fermented rice and lentil batter) is a variation of the popular South Indian food Thosai. Though it was only popular in South India, it can be found in all other parts of the country and overseas.

In Singapore, the most popular variant of Thosai is the Masala Thosai that is stuffed with spiced potatoes. Easily found in Tekka Centre or any vegetarian restaurant in the Little India neighbourhood, Masala Thosai is often served with chilli chutney, coconut chutney and a small bowl of lentil curry or sambar. Although cutlery is available, the traditional way (and known to many as the best way) to eat Masala Thosai is using your right hand to ensure that you have a generous amount of sauce when taking a bite.



Rojak, in its traditional form, is a fruit and vegetable salad dish commonly found in Indonesia, Malaysia and Singapore. Its origins come from being made in Kedah by Malay villagers. Having later learnt the recipe from them, Tamil Muslim Rojak vendors used modified sidecar motorcycles as preparation counters and to peddle their Rojak.

Specifically, in Singapore, Indian Rojak comes in an assortment of potatoes, eggs, beancurd and prawns fried in batter, served with a spicy-sweet peanut sauce.

Did you know that the term "rojak" is also used as a colloquial expression for an eclectic mix, in particular as a word describing the multi-ethnic character of Singaporean society?



### **DISCOVER** INDIA



Little India is a buzzing historic area that shows off the best of Singapore's Indian community.

Experience first-hand the culture and history of Little India on your walk. As you shop and dine in Tekka Centre (B12) for various traditional clothing and local delights, take the chance to interact with the multilingual stallholders and be part of Singapore's culturally diverse community. Visit the Sri Veeramakaliamman Temple (A11) which is constructed in the style of South Indian Tamil temples, common in Tamil Nadu. End your route at the photogenic residence of Tan Teng Niah, which is the last surviving Chinese villa in Little India built in 1900s.



Immerse yourself in the Indian culture and heritage by first visiting the Indian Heritage Centre (A3) to gain an insight into the Indian Heritage through various exhibitions and programmes. Indulge in a one-of-akind shopping experience at the shopping experience at Mustafa Centre (C5), a paradise for bargain hunters and shopaholics. Grab a bite at one of the Indian cuisine restaurants along Race Course Road for an unforgettable Indian dining experience. Try the popular Indian spice-infused rice dish, Biryani, paired with a meat of your choice and Acar, a tangy mix of pickled vegetable.


